MANAGER'S MESSAGE

I hope you are all enjoying your summer and getting ready to enjoy the cool, crisp days of Autumn. The Township has been very busy as Little Creek Stream Restoration Phase 2 has begun construction. The Township was able to attain grant funding for the entire project from design, permitting to construction. The Township also wishes to acknowledge the property owners and their willingness to allow the project to take place. The stream restoration project was highlighted at a recent statewide Stormwater MS4 forum and a presentation was given to participants about the project.

In June, there was a ribbon cutting for the grand opening of Little Creek Community Park. The ribbon cutting marked the completion of Phases 1 and 2. The event was well attended. Funding for both phases was also provided by the generous contributions of the York County Commissioners, Gladfelter (now Pixelle), and Church and Dwight. Grant funding was provided through the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation

and Natural Resources. The stream was restored from funds awarded by Department of Environmental Protection's Growing Greener grant and a grant from York County Stormwater Consortium. Additional trees were provided by the Chesapeake Bay Alliance and planting was achieved by the Master Watershed Stewards of York County. Raingardens were planted by the students of Spring Grove School District, boy scouts, girl scouts, Spring Grove Ambulance employees and many other community leaders.

Building this facility was a culmination of hard work, dedication, and partnerships the township can be proud of. That partnership has provided a park that is accessible, connected, well maintained and safe for the community now and for future generations.

The Township is going to be bidding trash collection services for the contract years beginning January 1, 2022, through December 31, 2026. The bids will be advertised in September with bid award taking place in October of this year. This means that your trash collector may change as well as trash collection dates. The successful bidder will be responsible for notifying all residents and businesses within the Township of the changes in December. The Township bids your trash collection to reduce disruptions in collections, keep costs down for individuals and to be sure that trash collection is being done efficiently and in compliance with State laws and regulations.

The date for leaf pickup will be posted on the Township's website. Please keep an eye on the Township website www.jacksontwpyork.org for updates on the trash bidding process as well as the date of Leaf Pickup.

TOWNSHIP MEETING HIGHLIGHTS:

- Authorization to award the bid for Phase 2 development of the Stream Restoration was given to Flyway Excavating, Incorporated - \$164,205.00.
- Authorization to award bids for Road Materials and Equipment Rental for 2021 road projects was given for the following: Crushed Aggregate (Stone) material – York Building Products - \$25,195.00; Bituminous Paving (Asphalt) material – York Materials Group - \$131,100.00; Equipment Rental (Paving) – E.K. Services, Incorporated - \$17,046.00.
- Authorization to award bids for Sunset Road Bridge repair was given to Clear View Excavation, Incorporated - \$95,510.00.
- Resolution 03-21 Authorizing Manager Ford/Spring Grove Regional Parks & Recreation Center to submit an Application for the Greenways, Trails and Recreation Program Grant through the Commonwealth Financing Authority was granted.
- Resolution 02-20 Terminating the Disaster Emergency Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic was rescinded.
- The Junkyard licenses were renewed for July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022 for the following locations: 329, 351 and 642 Jackson Square Road.
- The Board authorized the Deposition of ARPA (Covid Relief Funds) into an Interest Bearing PLGIT Account.
- The Board appointed Zachary Steckler to the Planning Commission Board for the remainder of a 4-year term thru 2024.
- The Board authorized the purchase of Movie Equipment for the Little Creek Community Park at a cost of \$4,199.00.
- The Board approved the sale of the following equipment: Cat Mill Head at the high bid of \$8,800.00 which was awarded to Shane Smallwood/H&H General Excavating of Spring Grove, PA; Case Tractor at the high bid of \$3,250.00 which was awarded to Stony Fork Creek Campground of Wellsboro, PA.

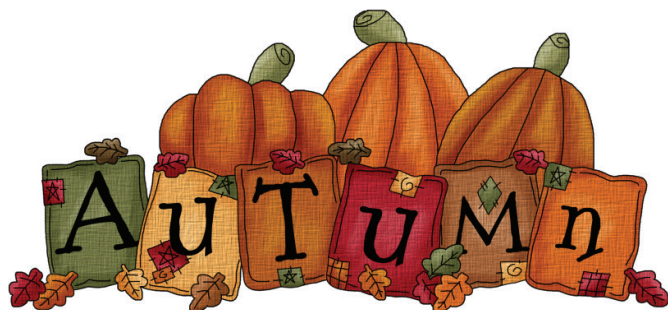

BASIC RESIDENTIAL GUIDELINES



- Trash, Recycling, and one bulk item must be curb side by 6:00 AM on your scheduled collection day, which is Thursday.
- Bags or containers must not exceed 33 gallons or 75 pounds.
- No more than 4 bags or containers will be collected per customer.
- Low Volume Customers must attach a bag to a bulk item.
- Call Penn Waste to schedule collection of appliances containing freon (air conditioners, refrigerators, freezers, etc.)
- No construction debris will be collected curb side.

NO POOL CHEMICALS

Pool chemicals are extremely combustible which is why they cannot be disposed of in your curbside trash and recycling bins. To dispose of them, check with the store you bought them from to see if they have any resources for disposal. You could also donate them to a local pool or check with your local solid waste authority to see if they accept them.

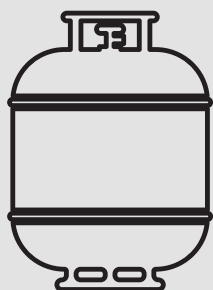


NO RECHARGEABLE BATTERIES

Rechargeable batteries can easily start fires when combined with the right materials. Never place these in your curbside collection bins. Several retailers such as Lowe's, Home Depot, and Target offer drop-off programs. You can also check with your local solid waste authority to see if they accept them.

NO LIVE AMMUNITION

Live ammunition should never go in your curbside trash and recycling. Check with local law enforcement, indoor gun ranges, or your local solid waste authority to see if they accept live ammunition.



NO PROPANE TANKS

Propane tanks are extremely flammable and should never be disposed of in your curbside trash and recycling bins. Contact your local solid waste authority to see if they accept them or ask the vendor you bought it from if they will take them back.

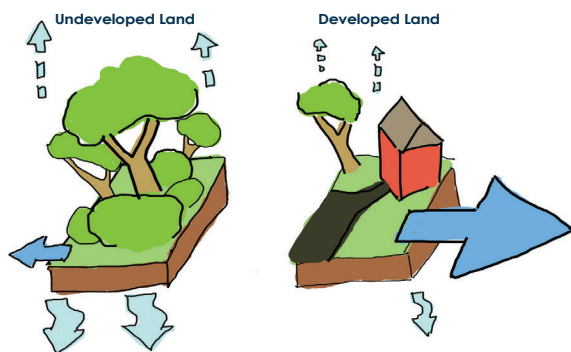

What is Stormwater?

Stormwater is the water that runs off the land after precipitation, either rain or snowmelt. Rain or snow can drain down into the soil (called infiltration), evaporate back into the atmosphere, be used by plants, or flow into streams or water bodies. The water that runs off the land to streams or lakes is referred to as stormwater runoff.

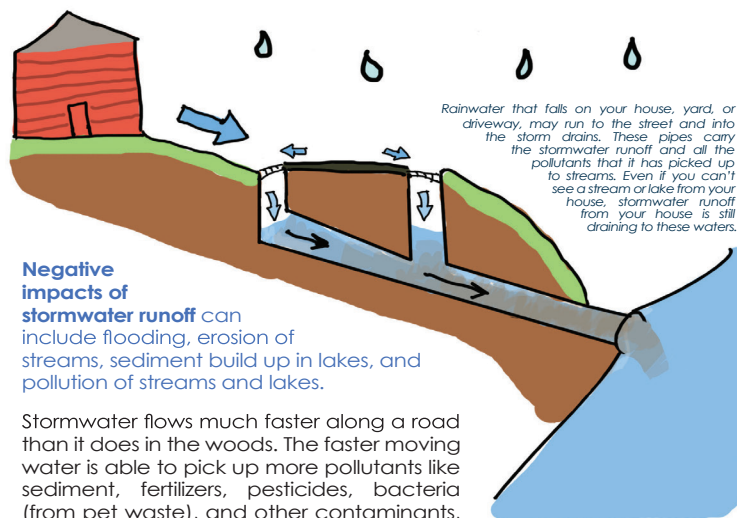
Stormwater runoff happens in natural, undeveloped areas, but typically only for larger storms. For most areas in Pennsylvania that are wooded or natural meadows, it takes about an inch or more of rain to produce runoff.

After development, the natural wooded or meadow areas are replaced with roofs, driveways, sidewalks, and streets. These hard surfaces are called impervious surfaces, and they do not allow water to drain through them, unlike how rain can drain into soil (which is called a pervious surface). When rain falls on impervious surfaces, it runs off rather than infiltrating into the soil or being taken up by vegetation.



When it rains on an undeveloped piece of property, much of the rainwater infiltrates into the soil or is evaporated back into the atmosphere. When vegetation is replaced with streets, driveways, sidewalks, houses, and lawns, less rainwater is able to infiltrate or return to the atmosphere, and more of the rain turns into runoff.

Why should you care about Stormwater Management?



Negative impacts of stormwater runoff can include flooding, erosion of streams, sediment build up in lakes, and pollution of streams and lakes.

Stormwater flows much faster along a road than it does in the woods. The faster moving water is able to pick up more pollutants like sediment, fertilizers, pesticides, bacteria (from pet waste), and other contaminants, and carry the pollutants to streams and lakes.

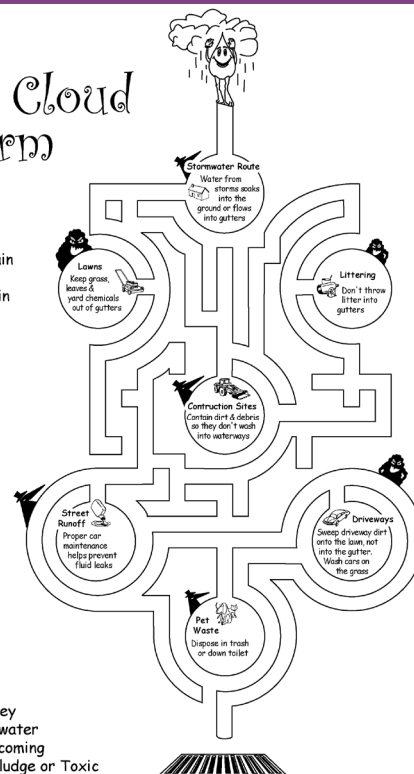
An increase in the amount of water that runs off after development and how quickly it runs off can cause erosion and instability in streams. Stormwater runoff can cause streams to become wider, deeper, and straighter, losing their natural bends (or meanders) and decreasing habitat for fish and other animals that live in streams. Stormwater from developed areas can also be hotter than natural stream sources. Warmer water holds less dissolved oxygen so stormwater can be harmful to fish like trout that need more oxygen.

It's easy to notice the flooding impacts of large rain storms, but over time, smaller storms can have an impact on streams, too. Across the state, about 95% of the rainfall volume occurs in small events (less than 2.4 to 3.2 inches depending on your location.)



From Storm Cloud to Storm Drain

The Stormwater system channels rain and snowmelt into gutters, which drain into streams and rivers. When people pollute stormwater, they also pollute our natural waterways.

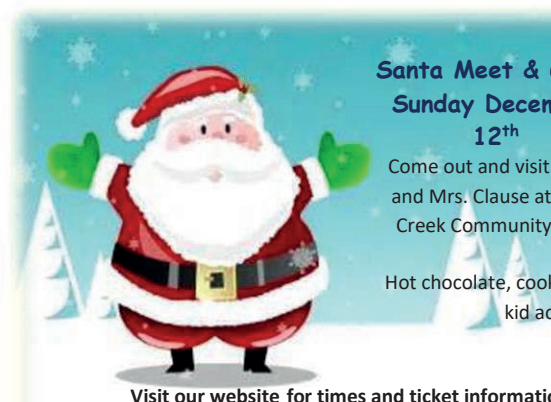
